This public art event, in the form of a processional walk, marks the 100th anniversary of the Explosion, and is the finale for NiS+TS's 2014-2017 project *Walking the Debris Field: Public Geographies of the Halifax Explosion*. With special collaborators and guests, this drift brings us through the heart of the debris field.

Storm date: Sunday December 10



The route uses sidewalks and has some hills. Please stay off the roads and streets, and cross at the intersections and marked crosswalks. The procession will take approximately one hour, and there will be a finale with music and refreshments at the basketball court on Richmond Street near Veith Street. Please download the free iOS app Drifts from the App Store.

We start at the smoking XYZ marker, near the Seedlings Community Garden. What happened here? Let's move towards the Family Courthouse on Devonshire, and listen for any words of truth and justice that might be spoken now, 100 years later. Proceed from here, across the back slope of Needham Hill, to another garden. Where is this mystery trail taking us? Climb up the hill, and find that beech tree that may have (or may not have) survived the explosion. Turn, and head down towards the harbour, to Veith Street, and stand in a house hole. Look across to the orphanage. What have we learned about absence and loss? Move closer to Ground Zero, and slow down when you see the bus stop. Is anyone coming? Are we too late? Turn and move partway up the Richmond hill, to the basketball court, where your friends, and family, and neighbours are waiting for you.
